ASL Topic-Comment Sentence Structure Rules

Basic Topic-Comment Structure

- Topic: Sets up what you're talking about (often comes first).
- o **Comment**: Provides information about the topic.
- **Example**: "CAT SLEEP" ("The cat is sleeping.")
- o **Note**: Action signs should be placed at the end of the sentence.
 - Example: "BALL HE KICK" ("He kicked the ball.")

Types of Questions

Yes/No Questions:

- Topic comes first, followed by a comment that seeks confirmation.
- Raise eyebrows, lean forward slightly, and hold eye contact to show you're asking a Yes/No question.
- Example: "YOU STUDENT YOU?" ("Are you a student?")

Wh- Questions:

- Topic comes first, followed by a comment that ends with a wh-question word.
- Lower eyebrows, lean forward slightly, and hold eye contact for emphasis.
- Example: "YOUR BOOK WHERE?" ("Where is your book?")
- Note: Incorporate a closing signal when applicable.
- Example: "YOU NAME WHAT YOU?" ("What is your name?")

Rhetorical Questions:

- Used to provide additional information or emphasize a point rather than to get an actual answer.
- Raise eyebrows to indicate that the question is rhetorical.
- **Example**: "MY FAVORITE FOOD WHAT? PIZZA" ("My favorite food? Pizza.")

Introducing Time

- Time comes first, followed by the topic and then the comment. This helps establish the timeline for the action.
- **Example**: "YESTERDAY CAT SLEEP" ("The cat slept yesterday.")
- Note: Time signs such as TODAY, TOMORROW, YESTERDAY, EVERYDAY, days
 of the week, etc., should be signed first.
- Example: "TUESDAY THURSDAY EVENING PIANO I PRACTICE" ("I practice piano on Tuesday and Thursday evenings.")
- Number times are placed before time signs.
 - Example: "12:30 TOMORROW FRIEND I-MEET THERE RESTAURANT" ("I will meet a friend at the restaurant tomorrow at 12:30.")

Using Descriptors

- o **Descriptors** (like adjectives) often come before the topic to give more detail.
- Example: "BLACK CAR COLOR DRIVE I" ("I drive a black car.")

Negation

- Add a negative sign after the topic or at the end of the comment. Shake your head to emphasize negation.
- Example: "HOMEWORK FINISH NOT I" ("I haven't finished my homework.")
- o **Note**: Negating comments such as 'can't, don't, won't' are placed at the end.
 - **Example**: "BACKYARD WORK DON'T-WANT I" ("I don't want to work in the backyard.")

Facial Expressions and Non-Manual Markers

- Yes/No Questions: Raised eyebrows.
- Wh- Questions: Lowered eyebrows.
- Negation: Headshake.
- **Topic-Comment Emphasis**: Nodding slightly to emphasize the topic.

Shoulder Shifting for Conjunctions

- Shoulder shifting is used to indicate options or contrasts, such as 'and', 'or', or 'but'.
- o Sign the conjunction during the shift in between the items.
- **Example**: "JACKET WANT BLACK (shift OR) BROWN WHICH YOU?" ("Do you want the black or brown jacket?")

Examples:

- Yes/No Question: "YOU TIRED YOU?" ("Are you tired?")
- Wh- Question: "SCHOOL START WHEN?" ("When does school start?")
- Rhetorical Question: "MY COLOR FAVORITE WHAT? BLUE" ("My favorite color? Blue.")
- o Time Introduction: "TOMORROW MEET FRIEND" ("I will meet a friend tomorrow.")
- Descriptor: "RED CAR DRIVE FAST" ("The red car is driving fast.")
- Negation: "THOSE-TWO LOOK-ALIKE NOT" ("Those two do not look alike.")
- Yes/No Question: "ICE CREAM LIKE YOU?" ("Do you like ice cream?")
- Wh- Question: "TEACHER NAME WHO?" ("What is the teacher's name?")
- Rhetorical Question: "I LOVE ASL? WHY BEAUTIFUL LANGUAGE" ("Why do I love ASL? It's a beautiful language.")
- Time Introduction: "NEXT-WEEK MOVIE WATCH I" ("I will watch a movie next week.")
- Descriptor: "BIG HOUSE COLOR WHITE LIVE I" ("I live in a big white house.")
- Negation: "I SWIM CAN'T" ("I can't swim.")
